Dear Readers,

When I was preparing a sermon last month on Jesus's instruction to Simon to launch out into the deep and cast his nets. I remembered Ernest Hemingway, the American novelist whose final publication before he died was The Old Man and the Sea. This novella tells of a Cuban fisherman called Santiago whose recent run of bad luck stretches for eighty-four days without a fish. On the eighty-fifth day he ventures further out and his hook is taken by a giant marlin. The strength of this fish is such that it pulls his boat for two days and nights. During this epic struggle Santiago comes to admire the noble creature. Eventually, on the third day, he manages to harpoon the marlin and fasten it to the side of his boat to take it back to market. But his ordeal is not over. Sharks circle the boat and devour the carcass, so all he brings back is an eighteen-feet-long skeleton.

Immediately on publication in 1952, the novella was seen as being layered with meanings. Santiago, the old man, is up against forces more powerful than himself, and some aspects of his struggle come to mind when we contemplate the agony of Christ in Passiontide. The two days and nights wrestling with the fish are tortuous: his back is braced against the rod and line, as Christ's was against the cross; the rim of his straw hat marks his forehead under the blazing sun, as the crown of thorns marked Christ's; and his bleeding hands ripped by the line remind us of Christ's nail wounds.


Santiago's struggle is that of the human predicament, for each of us is up against the unknown and the unpredictable, facing a future which is always hidden until it becomes the present. The nature of human existence is that we must make our decisions, some of them life-changing, without full knowledge of all the facts. All we have is the ocean's horizon beckoning us towards what lies beyond it. There's no knowing — it's all a matter of faith based on one who went before us. Such is our Lenten journey — and such is our life's journey.



Walking to Jerusalem - Blisters, hope and facts on the ground by Justin Butcher Hodder & Stoughton ISBN 9781473673717

To be hopeful in bad times is not just foolishly romantic. If we see only the worst, it destroys our capacity to do something. If we do act, in however a small a way, we don't have to wait for some grand utopian future.

A 3400 km walk from central London to Jerusalem over 147 days is hardly a small act. But in the light of the intractable issues burdening the people who live in Israel and the West Bank, the Just Walk could be considered of little consequence. Yet for Justin Butcher, his numerous companions, the Amos Trust and the Palestinian people for whom they trod the pilgrim routes across Europe it was a great undertaking.

Between July-October 2017 more than a 100 walkers marked the anniversaries of the Balfour Declaration, the 50th year of Israel's military occupation of Palestinian territories and the 10th year of the blockade of Gaza. They walked to ask the question: when will equal rights exist for all in the so-called Holy Land?

Mountain passes and flower-strewn meadows, vivacious nuns, wary farmers, skilled drivers, old Mercedes cars, numerous coffees, scary border guards, dodgy dealers, hapless refugees, a debate over the relationship of the Incarnation and Justice-making all emerge from Justin Butcher's record of a labour of love and holy perspiration.

Butcher is an astute guide to the exhausting dilemmas that swirl around the three faiths and the two peoples who seek to live together in a piece of land that carries deep significance for all of them. But isn't he inevitably biased toward to one side? Now there's a question. If you ask that one, you need also to ask: Can you support victims of injustice and not be biased? And what if some of the strongest voices in the text are Israelis and Jews who speak against the policy of the current Israeli regime? And what if, as Butcher himself suggests, that due to the Balfour Declaration the UK should be apologising to both Israeli and Palestinian for a deal that created, to a significant degree, the current situation?

So this book is more than a shelf-filler in Waterstone's travel section. It is an exploration of the spirituality of justice-seeking. It is a parable of how to live with hope when the facts on the ground are grim. It is an encounter with the Beatitude of Jesus who declared that we are blessed when we hunger and thirst for righteousness. A Beatitude which like all blessings can only be received when we walk together.
