Dear friends

Many years ago I attended a course held at the home of a local Anglican priest. As we met fortnightly for a whole year we got to know each other very well. I was the only Baptist, others were Anglican, Methodist, Catholic, Quaker and one or two who weren't at all sure what they were! In other words, it was about as much a mixed bag of Christians as you could find.

The funny thing is that I can barely remember what the course was about; the real learning experience was in growing closer to Christians from traditions different from my own and, to my surprise and joy, discovering they had things to share with me and, hopefully, things I could share with them. I understood, for the first time, why Jesus himself had prayed that his people would be one.

Since that experience, long ago, I have never been able to conceive of working any way except ecumenically. Indeed, the ecumenical landscape was one of the things that attracted me to Sutton. Since then we have become a Local Ecumenical Partnership, and we do lots and lots of things together; even as you read this, our churches will be engaged in our joint Lent talks, and planning for a joint Maundy Thursday service.

The problem with working together is that it can become little more than a habit. From time to time, therefore, it is good to stand back and reassess where our ecumenical endeavours have taken us, and where we sense God is leading us to go. This is a process we have now embarked on, beginning with a Day Apart for some of our church leaders (Justine reflects on this event elsewhere in this issue). Where this might take us in our ecumenical work I cannot tell.

But I can say that the lessons I learned long ago at my course have never been forgotten. We really and truly have much to learn from each other, and Jesus' prayer for unity among his people is as valid as ever it was.

Conversations About Conversations

The Churches Uniting in Central Sutton Day Apart (from the pressures of the rest of the world, that is, not each other) was a day of conversations. From discovering more about our neighbours, making new friendships and rekindling old ones to conversations about the nature and the purpose of the Church we spent a great deal of time talking and listening to each other. And I think we came away with a deeper awareness and understanding of the range and depth of feeling around our ecumenical life together as individuals and as three separate churches with four traditions, seeking to live and walk in the way of Christ.



If anyone was hoping to walk away from the day with a blueprint or plan of action they were going to be disappointed. Rather, what I certainly came away with was a sense of the lived reality of working and walking together, a sense of the dreams and aspirations as well as the fears and red lines that surround our future steps. What seemed to be clear is that people want our life together to be real and living; a witness to those in the community of Sutton that the Church is not dead but relevant. Nor is it about three buildings that are ideal for heritage purposes but about living, breathing and hopefully growing communities of concern, well-being, and hope for all. I came away with a sense that those of us who were there wanted to be a witness to the community that God is good, that God cares for all people and for creation and that we are not simply a club that exists merely for the good of its members.

But it was, in many ways, a day of conversations about conversations, the start of a discussion, not the end. And if it is to make a difference to the way that we demonstrate that we are Churches Uniting in Central Sutton then we need to take the conversation forward; discover more about our shared values, visions and dreams, not being afraid to recognize and respect our differences and distinctive visions, but praying that as the Body of Christ we really can show the world that there is, as St Paul puts it a more excellent way.

The CUCS banner was a focus for meditation and discussion during the day.


A Change of Climate: Hilary Mantel (Penguin: 1994) reviewed by Dave Dickinson

The dinosaurs died out because of a change of climate; their habitat altered. In Hilary Mantel's pre-Wolf Hall novel, A Change of Climate, Ralph and Anna Eldred's habitat alters when they go as missionaries to southern Africa. Do they or their faith, like the dinosaurs, die out?

Recently, Mantel has gained a formidable reputation as an historical novelist. It is well-deserved, but it disguises her interest in religion as a novelist. Before the acclaim and popularity of Wolf Hall, Mantel was already recognised as a stylish writer who seemed to want to try something new with every novel she wrote. I worry now that her other work, where theology and religious belief are often explored in interesting ways, might be overlooked. She's no one-trick pony.

One of the characters in A Change of Climate thinks of the church as a "bauble shop" from which she can pick and choose whatever she finds personally helpful. Another sees churchgoers as narrow-minded people who have no sense of adventure, always preferring to stay at home rather than test out their faith in the cut and thrust of real life. Not surprisingly, Ralph, who experiences a change of climate when he moves to Africa, wants to put into practice a different, non-dinosauric form of Christianity – one that passes no judgment on others.

I am tempted to invite you to buy or borrow a copy, read it and meet with me at 2 o'clock on Wednesday 1 April in Trinity's Oasis Cafe where we can share our thoughts about this page-turner with a profound moral dimension. I can't resist the temptation! So shall we make it a date?
