Christmas – the feast of human vulnerability by Cécile Schnyder

I am a member of the L'Arche Community and have been for a while. L'Arche is a Christian, ecumenical and international community in which people with and without learning disability live and share daily life together. In a world that places high value on success, independence and youth, L'Arche offers a place of hospitality where people can be transformed by an intense experience of living in community, relationship, disability and difference.

L'Arche tries to be a sign.

In L'Arche we are a very mixed bunch of people, erratic at times, self-seeking and argumentative, theologically very slow on the uptake, each of us broken, spiritually disabled and hindered by our own egos: just ordinary people. We are made of flesh and blood, we cry and laugh, sweat and sometimes swear. The bridge between disabled and non-disabled community members is humanity and our fragile humanity lived out in community is probably the most powerful thing in the world.

One of the days when this becomes most tangible in the community is when we celebrate Christmas together. As we sing, pray, celebrate and cook together, differences vanish. And as we eat, help each other to eat, drink and help each other to drink we declare each other broken yet holy. It becomes unclear who is teaching whom as I am invited to confront my own disability, vulnerability and neediness.

But no, L'Arche is not simply a nice cosy place. There are L'Arche communities in war torn countries such as Ukraine, Palestine and Syria. However "normal" this crisis has become for Al Safina (L'Arche Syria), they will never get used to it. Faced with fuel and food shortages, lengthy power and water cuts, unsafe conditions, the deafening noise of planes and shooting, and the threat of rockets, they have chosen to stay; to stay as a sign of humanity amidst the insanity and inhumanity of war.



And so as we in L'Arche London act out the Christmas story we embody something of the mystery of the incarnation. It reminds us of our calling beyond disability and brokenness; the calling to be human.

Mr Holmes a film review by Mike Dales

Imagine the great detective, Sherlock Holmes, at the age of 93. Mrs Hudson and Dr Watson are long gone, and Sherlock lives in retirement in Sussex, keeping bees and being cared for by a housekeeper and her young son. It certainly is a very different take on the usual stories based on Conan-Doyle's great creation.

The Holmes we meet here is very much a fallen idol, far from the prying eyes of the fans who once gathered outside his rooms in Baker Street. The year is 1947, and Holmes is showing the signs of short-term memory loss. He longs to recover one memory in particular, the details of the last case he worked on some 30 years earlier. It was a case in which Holmes got something terribly wrong - wrong enough to provoke his retirement. Now it is Holmes, rather than Dr Watson, who is setting pen to paper in an effort to set the record straight and to give himself peace of mind.



Mr Holmes is a gentle, touching and thoughtful film. Rather than a great mystery, it's a tale for grownups about the gaining of wisdom, even in old age. It is a story about ageing, regret and redemption and that is why it is so effective in tugging at our emotions.

Ian McKellen, as Holmes, is wonderful and it would not surprise me if he gained nominations when the awards season comes around. Milo Parker, too, is a revelation as the housekeeper's son.

Mr Holmes was released in cinemas in June and has now been released on DVD. It comes highly recommended.


