Dear friends

By the time you read this, the craze may be so over that we'll have forgotten what it ever was ........

But in late July and early August the Rectory at St Nicholas was under attack. Not from wasps or anything nasty but from Pokemon hunters, chasing the latest 'pocket monster' in the augmented reality game that swept the nation and indeed much of the world. In the game, which is played on mobile smart phones, the idea is to capture, train and evolve 'monsters', sometimes cute and sometimes less so. The augmented reality bit means that these monsters turn up on your phone screen superimposed onto the real world around you. Different places have been established as focus points for these 'monsters' and it just so happens that the St Nicholas Rectory, the mural along the alley way and several other points in the St Nicholas Churchyard received such an honour.

The good news was that I could capture huge numbers of monsters without leaving my house. The bad news was that on the first couple of days there were up to 30 people in a crowd by my front door trying to catch them too.

The game's designers have said that one of the objectives behind the game was to get people out from behind static screens and walking around their neighbourhood. It was about 'gamifying' (sic) exercise: making it fun and interactive. It may have achieved that goal - I certainly have spoken to lots of parents who have said how the game got their children out and about. But more than that: It got whole families, multigenerational groups out together. I met one lady in her fifties who was playing with her mum who was in her eighties. Similarly, I have had conversations with people I would otherwise never have encountered without the game as an opening topic of conversation. Yes there were potential risks but also a potential for good. Adults and children were learning from each other, walking together, talking together as equals. They were united in one task, with one goal in mind.

I wonder what it might be like if the Church were the same?


#### Friendly Places?

At the Hay Festival in June, Salman Rushdie lamented the lost art of memorising poetry. It is a skill I never had. I used to "say my piece" at Sunday School anniversaries but it was always a chore. Intentional learning by heart did not work for me. The nearest I came to memorising a poem was through repeated reading. One I have often read is John Clare's I am, written in 1845 when the poet was isolated from family and friends in Northampton General Lunatic Asylum. Is it one of the most melancholic poems ever?

The poem begins "I am: yet what I am none cares or knows, My friends forsake me like a memory lost." Clare speaks of living "with shadows tossed Into the nothingness of scorn and noise." These terms convey the nightmare of 19th century asylums. His life was shipwrecked and he dwelt in a sea of living dreams. It sounds hopeless.

But, there is a positive tone in the poem, for Clare expresses a hope, a desire, a deep longing to be free of his awful existence to abide "untroubled and untroubling" with his "Creator, God, and sleep as I in childhood sweetly slept." The poem that began desolately ends with the poet at peace, "the grass below - above, the vaulted sky.

The poem goes some way towards explaining my philosophy of church. Church is where your wellbeing is improved. What John Bell of the Iona Community called "a touching place" (that is, where we can be in touch with God) is a healing place. It's a thin place where we can see through from earth to heaven, from nightmare to peace. Last year, Trinity Church signed a pledge to be "A Friendly Place." This means it is committed to be a place of welcome for people struggling to achieve or maintain mental health. The pledge keeps us on our toes and there will be opportunities to talk further about what it means to be a healing, touching, friendly and thin place.



I suspect it means church is a place where 'I' can be who I am.

#### The Hollow Crown a review by Mike Dales

Nobody would ever pretend that Shakespeare's plays are 'easy'. They can be difficult to watch and understand, partly due to the Elizabethan language used, and partly because most people are not all that familiar with them, apart from a few of the more accessible plays. Every now and then a film version of a play is released to greater or lesser acclaim: the Zeffirelli (with Olivia Hussey) and Baz Luhrmann (with Leonardo DiCaprio) versions of Romeo & Juliet and the more recent Michael Fassbender version of Macbeth come to mind.

The historical plays are especially ignored by most people. This is why the two sets of plays with the overall title of 'The Hollow Crown' produced for TV and available on DVD are so exciting.


The first set was first seen in 2012 and contained: Richard II, Henry IV (part I), Henry IV (part II) and Henry V. It starred Ben Whishaw, Jeremy Irons and Tom Hiddleston among many others. Ben Whishaw and Simon Russell Beale won BAFTAs for their performances while Jeremy Irons was nominated for a Screen Actors Guild Award for Best Actor for his role as Henry IV. The second set was seen in 2016 and consisted of the 'Wars of the Roses' plays': Henry VI (part I), Henry VI (part II), Henry VI (part III) and Richard III). Benedict Cumberbatch starred as Richard III.

All the films were filmed largely on location in Kent (including Leeds and Dover Castles) and were marked by the high production values we would expect from BBC historical dramas.

However, all the nice costumes and great locations in the world would amount to nothing unless the dramas turned out to be both inspiring and exciting. It is a mark of the quality of the adaptations and the excellence of the acting and production that you find yourself simply enjoying it and being able to follow it despite the relatively unfamiliar cadences of Elizabethan poetry and language.

A favourite moment? Many! However, one that comes to mind is Patrick Stewart's 'This sceptered isle' speech in Richard II. You can see it at: https:// vimeo.com/45513719

#### Will Your Anchor Hold?

Better known as *The Anchor Song* to all serving and ex-members of The Boys' Brigade, I have had the privilege of 50+ years of service in the Brigade and have sung this hymn around camp fires, at BB rallies at the Royal Albert Hall and during many parade services and Bible classes.

The words of the hymn were written by Priscilla Owens who was born in Baltimore USA in 1829 and are based on Hebrews 6:19:

We have this hope as an anchor for our lives. It is safe and sure and goes through the curtain of the heavenly temple into the inner sanctuary.

The BB has a badge which contains an anchor and a motto which is sure and steadfast. Sir William Smith, the founder of the BB in 1883, was a keen sailor being born and brought up on the NE coast of Scotland in a strong Christian family and he originally called the junior section life boys.



The hymn has a roaring chorus which has lifted many a roof and I hope will continue to do so:

We have an anchor that keeps the soul; Steadfast and sure while the billows roll; Fastened to the Rock which cannot move, Grounded firm and deep in the Saviour's love!
